Suggested updates Rationale for updates	-Remove undergraduate grade replacement limit. -Make undergraduate grade replacement automatic for repeats of regular courses with original earned grades of C, D, or E, and for repeats of courses designated as repeatable for credit when the original earned grade is E. -Make undergraduate grade replacement an option for courses designated as repeatable for credit when the original earned grade is C or D. -Change undergraduate grade replacement to use highest graded attempt instead of latest graded attempt in GPA. -Change Complete Withdrawal (WC) to count as a course attempt for all students. -Increase allowed repeats from 2 to 3 for all students. -Add option for grade replacement for students in JD program. -Add option for grade replacement for a single course for graduate students. 	-Current limits on GRO block some students from graduating. - GRO setup requiring students to apply for GRO prevents some students from making use of the policy if they are unaware of the process or miss the GRO deadline. Changing to an automatic process will allow all students to benefit from the policy equally. -Current policy replaces the original grade with the grade from the repeat attempt, even if that grade lowers the student's GPA. Changing setup to keep the highest earned grade protects students from unforeseen circumstances that may result in a lower repeated grade. Graduate & Professional -Current practice for JD degree allows for 3 GROs; updating policy to explicitly define that option. -Addition of GRO at the graduate level adds consideration for working professionals that are simultaneously			
	completing a graduate degree. These students frequently take one course at a time, which creates challenges in rectifying a low GPA.

Grading for Repeated Courses

By default for all students, when a completed course with a passing or failing grade is repeated, the cumulative grade-point-average (GPA) will reflect the grades earned in both the first and second attempts. Credit will be applied only once to the degree program, unless the course is designated repeatable for credit by the department.

Undergraduate Grade Replacement Opportunity

Undergraduate students who have not received a bachelor's degree from the University of Arizona may use the Grade Replacement Opportunity (GRO) when repeating certain undergraduate courses; graduate students and graduate level courses are not eligible. GRO offers students the ability to replace grades of C, D, or E by repeating the course. Grades earned using the GRO will replace one previous grade for the course in the calculation of the grade point average (GPA), even if the grade from the repeated attempt is lower than the first attempt. Both the original grade and the grade from the repeated attempt remain on the academic record. GRO may be used for a maximum of 3 courses.

Certain courses are designated as repeatable for credit; credit for these courses can be earned multiple times as indicated in the course catalog.

Certain courses may not be repeated:

- · Courses with original grades of A or B
- Success Courses

The opportunity to repeat a course depends on course availability; students are not guaranteed the ability to repeat courses.

Undergraduate Grading for Repeated Courses

When undergraduate students repeat Regular Graded undergraduate courses, the student's grade-point-average (GPA) reflects only the highest grade earned in the repeated course. Credit is earned only for the completion that is included in the GPA.

All grades earned in the course remain on the academic record; grades from each attempt on a course may be taken into consideration for students applying to competitive majors or graduate programs at the University of Arizona or other institutions.

The student's cumulative units and GPA are adjusted when the final grade for the repeat attempt has been posted. Only grades of A, B, C, D, or E are reflected in the GPA; when a repeat attempt results in a grade of S, P, F, I, O, W, WC, WO, or XO, the GPA and earned units will reflect the regular grade of the previous attempt.

The GRO filing process and instructions are accessible on the Office of the Registrar website. GRO filing deadlines are set by the Registrar and published at Dates and Deadlines. When the final grade for the GRO repeat attempt has been processed in the Office of the Registrar, the cumulative units and grade point—average (GPA) will be adjusted. Grades of I and Y are not final grades. After filing for GRO, it is the student's responsibility to notify the Office of the Registrar of any change that may affect the registration in the course being repeated.

- GRO may only be used when repeating the same course with the same grading type; students cannot replace a grade in the original course using a different course.
- The following course types are not eligible for GRO: Credit by Exam, Grade by Exam, Individual Studies courses (i.e., Preceptorship, Directed Research, Internship, Practicum, and Independent Study), Developmental courses (i.e., those with AX/BX after the course number), and courses taken for Pass/Fail grades.
- GRO repeat attempt grades of O, W, WO or XO count as attempts, but do not replace the grade in the first attempt.
- If a student passes the first attempt, but fails the GRO repeat attempt, the failing grade is calculated in the grade point average (GPA); however, the units earned in the first attempt may be applied toward degree requirements.

- For courses with an original earned grade of C, D, or E, the GPA will reflect the highest grade earned.
- For courses designated as repeatable for credit with an original earned grade of E, the GPA will reflect the grade of the second attempt if higher than E.
- For courses designated as repeatable for credit with an original earned grade of C or D, the second attempt will earn additional credit and the GPA will reflect the grades of both enrollments. Students may petition to have the GPA reflect the higher grade of the second attempt instead of earning additional credit for the repeat.
- Grades earned through Credit by Exam are permanent and their inclusion in the GPA cannot be altered by course repeats.

Graduate and Professional Grading for Repeated Courses

For graduate and professional (Law, Medicine, Pharmacy, and Veterinary Medicine) courses, when a completed course with a passing or failing grade is repeated, the cumulative **grade-point-average (GPA)** will reflect the grades earned in all attempts. Credit will be applied only once to the degree program, unless the course is designated Repeatable for Credit.

The Grade Replacement Opportunity (GRO) offers students the limited ability to replace an earned grade by repeating the course. Grades earned using the GRO will replace one previous grade for the course in the calculation of the **grade-point-average (GPA)**, even if

	 Students in the Juris Doctorate program may attempt GRO for 3 courses (maximum 10 total units) with original earned grades of C- or lower.
	 GRO is not available to undergraduate students enrolled in graduate courses, or to students in Medicine, Pharmacy, or Veterinary Medicine programs.
